
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Cycle Brakes and the Manufacture of the Same.

This invention relates to cycle brakes and the manufacture of the same, and refers more particularly to the brake block shoes or pans of the brake. In carrying this invention into effect the shoe or pan A is formed from an oblong blank of metal, the two sides at a2 and one end a3 of which are bent up at an angle to the base a4, so as to incline inwards and form a pan or slide to



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receive the bottom of the brake block. A portion of the sides at a2 is cut away near the centre a5, and the portion a6 of the base a4 between the cuts is bent downwards to form a circular eye for attaching the pan A to the pin B which fits into the brake stirrup. A portion by of the reverse end of the pin B to that which fits into the stirrup is reduced to form a neck b2, the eye a6 of the pan A being slid over the pin B and pressed into the neck b2, so that it lies flush with the main portion of the pin and prevents the pan A from becoming disconnected from the pin B.

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
