Jebson, and J. C. Underwood, using "Mosquitos," reported a trouble-free 160-mile trip.

Whilst the crowd gathered at Alton Towers to gaze at the 686 finishers (821 entered), to hear tales of midnight adventure in the Pennines or Pimlico, competitors themselves compared notes or slept. Rain, which had been threatening since the blustering, grey dawn, held off its onslaught and, whilst the A.-C.U. calculated the results tabulated below, the Nottingham Tornado M.C. set its stage for a short, but first-class "grass" event starring E. Midlands talent, including S. F. Minty, A. J. Cresswell, A. R. Ellison and the popular R. Pritchard, who put up fastest time of the day.
